Programme Structure

Programme Structure Description

The programme can be studied over three years (360 credits) or four years (480 credits) full time. On the three year model, study is undertaken at three levels, one for each year of study. 120 credits are required for the completion of each level and 360 credits for the completion of the full honours programme. In addition, under the four-year, 480 credit version of the programme, the programme will offer the opportunity of an additional study year abroad following Level 5. Students will be enrolled on a 480 credit honours with study abroad programme. Of those 480 credits, 120 will be taken via a Level 5 study abroad module [5024LAWCJ]. The modules to be studied in the host institution must be agreed in advance. The Level 5 mean for the final award mark will be calculated based upon the 240 credits at Level 5. The programme is taught within the Academic Framework. Modules are two types: core and options. The programme is based on a two semester academic year with modules being delivered and assessed in either semester 1 or semester 2, apart from the year-long Dissertation (6016LAWCJ). All modules at Level 4 are core and must be taken, while at level 5, 40 credits are core, and 80 credits come from choosing four options. All modules at level 6 are optional, and are either 40 credits (Dissertation) or 20 credits (all other modules). The above rules apply for students enrolling on the programme in 2021/22 and beyond. For students who started on the programme at level 4 in 2020/21, the following programme rules apply: seven core modules at level 4 (4017LAWCJ, 4301LAWPL, 4301LAWCL, 4301LAWFL, 4026LAWCJ, 4303LAWEU, 4019LAWCJ); one core module at level 5 (5029LAWCJ - Bridging Law and Justice) plus a choice of two optional modules from three in semester one (5020LAWCJ, 5018LAWCJ, 5301LAWCL), and three optional modules from five in semester two (5300LAWCL, 5028LAWCJ, 5019LAWCJ, 5022LAWCJ, 5304LAWCL); no core modules at level 6, students to choose from the following optional modules, which are all 20 credit modules apart from the Dissertation (6016LAWCJ) as follows: 6016LAWCJ, 6008LAWCJ, 6020LAWCJ, 6011LAWCJ, 6012LAWCJ, 6018LAWCJ, 6014LAWCJ, 6302LAWFL, 6301LAWPL, 6303LAWPL, 6306LAWCL, 6319LAWCL, 6301LAWFL, 6303LAWFL, 6021LAWCJ, 6009LAWCJ, 6307LAWCL, 6102LAWPL. 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Teaching, Learning and Assessment

Via lectures, tutor-led tutorials, student-led seminars and problem-based seminars. Assessment is by way of different combinations of unseen/seen, closed/open book examinations, essays, dissertations, online assessments and some oral presentations

Opportunities for work related learning

Students are given the opportunity to engage with LJMU's CareerSmart programmes, which aim to equip students with the skills required for the legal and criminal justice workplace, throughout their courses, and in particular via teaching on the Skills for Success in Law and Criminal Justice module (4028LAWCJ - including CareerSmart training and assessment), the optional Professional Development (5020LAWCJ) module at level 5, the optional Criminal Advocacy module at level 6 (6024LAWCJ) and through personal tutor work at all levels. Students also have the opportunity to make work-based learning, via a work placement relevant to legal or criminal justice study, part of the research for their independently-developed dissertations on the optional Dissertation module (6016LAWCJ) at Level 6. The optional Level 6 Criminal Advocacy module gives students further valuable insight into the skills needed to practice as a solicitor or barrister. In addition, the 4-year mode of the programme allows students to study on a one-year placement abroad (see award outcomes section above), thereby increasing students' knowledge of legal systems outside the UK, and enhancing their employability and work-related skills as a result.
