Course Structure

Programme Structure Description	The part-time programme has been designed to provide a coherent learning experience with progression via modules which have been designed to reflect broadly defined and agreed teaching aims at each stage. Progression is achieved through modules which are delivered consecutively. In semester one (year one) the 30 credit core module 7100ENGLIT orientates students into key critical debates and methodologies which will underpin their postgraduate studies in literature. In Semester two (year one) students take the Core module 'Mobilities' 7102ENGLIT. In semester one (year two) students take Core module 7106ENGLIT 'Place' and begin the 7105ENGLIT Dissertation Module. The second semester (year two) proceeds with one optional module from 7104ENGLIT 'Public Culture and Collaborative Practice'; 7103ENGLIT 'Objects'; or 7101ENGLIT 'Bodies'. Option modules are indicative and all options listed may not be available every academic year. The alternative exit award Postgraduate Certificate is available for students leaving the Programme after gaining 60 taught Level 7 credits. The alternative exit award Postgraduate Diploma is available for students leaving the Programme after gaining 120 taught Level 7 credits.

Teaching, Learning and Assessment

Teaching, Learning and Assessment	Teaching is through seminars, workshops, one-to-one tutorials, in addition to off-site visits. It focuses on the close reading of texts, including critical and theoretical material, explored in detailed discussion and through feedback on written and oral presentations. Formative assessment of knowledge and understanding is primarily through a range of coursework, including: critical commentaries; research essays; seminar presentations; dissertation outline proposal. The research project /dissertation provides a summative assessment of knowledge gained pertaining to a specific and identifiable literary or cultural field. Intellectual skills are developed through a combination of teaching methods, assessment tasks and detailed feedback. Formative assessment of intellectual development is through a variety of assessed tasks, including critical commentaries, research essays, seminar presentations and the dissertation outline proposal. The final research project /dissertation provides a summative assessment of research skills, analytical skills, presentational skills and progress in the development of ideas. Professional skills are developed through a combination of teaching methods, assessment of professional and practical skills takes place across the programme through a variety of assessed tasks, including critical commentaries, research essays, seminar presentations and the dissertation outline proposal. The final research project /dissertation provides a summative assessment. Key skills are promoted throughout all modules through a variety of tasks. Students are encouraged to communicate ideas both individually and in groups, to a variety of audiences. They are encouraged to use appropriate resources in an effective way and to present findings in a range of approved formats to meet specified deadlines. Transferable skills are assessed through a variety of tasks including presentations, critical commentaries, research essays and the dissertation.

Alternative qualifications considered	Applicants for the MA in English Literature will normally be considered in the light of their ability to meet the following criteria: Students should normally have a good first degree(2:1 or above) in a literature, cultural history or related subject. Appropriate indicators will include: two references and academic transcripts or their equivalent. Samples of written work and / or an interview may also be requested. The student must demonstrate a sufficient level of knowledge to embark on the programme (including the required linguistic competence) and to complete the programme within the required time limits. Students should provide evidence, in the view of the assessors, of the learning capability, study opportunity, and commitment to a postgraduate programme of study. The programme of study offers the student the opportunity to develop their personal and professional skills to an appropriate level and the School of Humanities and Social Science is able to provide appropriate supervision and facilities for their chosen programme of work. Although most applicants will be graduates, the fact that candidates may not have a degree is not necessarily a bar to entry. Non-standard applications will be considered and subject to an interview with two members of the department and will ensure accessibility and inclusivity. Mature entry. In exceptional circumstances applications by mature applicants, practitioners or workers in cultural industries without sufficient formal qualifications for entry will be considered and will be subject to interview with two members of the department. We accept candidates who are able to demonstrate the ability to benefit from and contribute to the programme. Each application is considered by two programme tutors including the Programme Leader for MA in English Literature. Where English is not a first language, an IELTS score of 6.5 must be achieved with a score of 7 for written work.
