Teaching, Learning and Assessment

The methods used to enable outcomes to be achieved and demonstrated are as follows:

The acquisition of knowledge and skills is gained through a range of teaching and learning approaches that include lectures, workshops, seminars and tutorials depending upon the subject matter and the learning experience and level of study.

Students will be taught in a range of group sizes with a focus on both individual and group work, to ensure that students gain an understanding and experience of teamwork and working alone. Theoretical concepts will be applied to practical examples and experiences to enable students to see their relevance. All modules in the programme emphasise student-centred learning, involving students in task-based activities followed by discussion, feedback and a wider application of the concepts.

Work-related learning forms an integral part of the programme and will give students an opportunity to engage with the external environment at each level.

Through PDP students will be encouraged to develop and work towards more personal and professional goals. Students are encouraged to identify their strengths and weaknesses and set appropriate goals and strategies for achievement.

Students are encouraged to use a variety of ICT and media to broaden their understanding of the subject. Tutorial support is given on all modules through a variety of processes and support is also offered through the personal tutor system.

Formal assessment of knowledge and understanding is assessed through a range of methods including essays; reports; presentations; portfolios and case studies. There will be a mix of individual and group assessment.

Guidance and feedback on assessments are provided at modular level. Criteria for assessment accompanies individual assignments. Indicative and essential sources accompany course outlines.

Programme structure - programme rules and modules

Students will be offered the opportunity of either a study abroad or a placement year at Level 5 (they cannot do both). Students will be offered a semester abroad in semester 2 of Level 5 (60 credits). They are able to undertake a semester abroad and a placement year. However students cannot take up the study abroad year AND the semester 2 abroad option.

Semester 2 Abroad

60 credits at Level 5 will be replaced with appropriate study abroad. Students will be enrolled onto a single study abroad module (5011LBSEVM) will which replace the semester 2 modules on the standard programme. This study abroad should cover the same learning outcomes as the modules being replaced. The modules to be

studied in the host institution must be agreed in advance.

Study Abroad Year

The programme will offer the opportunity of an additional study year abroad following Level 5. Students will be enrolled on a 600 credit honours with study abroad programme. Of those 600 credits, 120 will be taken via a Level 5 study abroad module (5010LBSEVM) the modules to be studied in the host institution must be agreed in advance.

Sandwich Year

The aim is to provide students with an extended period of work experience at an approved partner that will complement their programme of study at LJMU. This will give the students the opportunity to develop professional skills relevant to their programme of study, as well as attitude and behaviours necessary for employment in a diverse and changing environment. The placement year will follow Level 5 and students will be enrolled on a 600 credit honours sandwich programme and also onto the module 5009LBSEVM.

Level 5 Options

At Level 5 students can choose either 5007LBSSB Sports Law or 5008LBSSB Sports Events.

This programme specification applies to students starting the programme from September 2021 onwards. Students enrolled prior to September 2021 will be aligned to the previously validated programme specification.
