Educational aims of the programme

To produce graduates who can demonstrate practically with an underlying theoretical understanding the current concepts of dance practices, including elements of dance making, performing and/or facilitation in education and community settings.

To provide high quality, stimulating and rigorous approaches to a variety of dance practices including the creative process and facilitation and leadership within community/education environments.

To foster the development of creative thought and problem solving skills, as well as knowledge and understanding that will enable students to become articulate and communicative practitioners in a variety of settings including creative and community/educational practices.

To promote the development of graduates who are critical, independent thinkers; possessing a range of transferable skills, graduate and world of work skills.

To encourage students to engage with employability skills by completing a self-awareness statement

To facilitate work related opportunities for students to develop cognitive, technical and practical skills and insights necessary to engage effectively in exploring a chosen aspect of dance practices. Within this facilitation there will be opportunities to work alongside professional practitioners both within the University setting and within the world of work.

To enrich teaching and learning by supporting staff development and research, which engages theoretical and practical investigation and furthers academic and artistic discourse both within and beyond the University.

To enable students to further their own specialised area of exploration into the field of dance practices.

Teaching, Learning and Assessment

The methods used to enable outcomes to be achieved and demonstrated are as follows:

Workshops: a controlled practical environment through which students can learn the skills listed above. The workshops may take one or more of the following slants:

a) Skills workshop, in which students develop both performative and ensemble skills

b) Skills workshop, in which students develop creative or dance related work exploring both the process and the product

c) Creative workshop, in which students develop creative or dance or theatre arts related work exploring both the process and the product in a contextual setting

d) Experimental workshop, in which students explore, test and interrogate theory through practice and discussion

Lectures: delivery of a body of knowledge to student groups.

Seminars: group discussion led by staff or students.

Tutorials: these may be individual or small group to provide a discursive forum for feedback and assessment and to offer individual academic guidance.

Extra-Curricular activities: students may also have opportunities to extend their experience and competence by means of additional productions, projects, workshops and classes.

Study Skills: the University provides a study skills tutor from who students may seek extra support for English language-writing skills.

Work-Related Learning: students undertake a number of tasks whilst on placement and produce evaluative reflections on work undertaken.

Practical: Performance assessment – both formal and informal venues, in varying sizes of groups, both public and in-house audience.

Practical: Studio practice: assessed classes.

Leading workshops.

Teaching: to client groups, peers and staff.

Workshop Diary/Reflective Logbook: a personal logbook/diary or portfolio of tasks.

Seminar Presentations: to peers and staff.

Presentation: to staff.

Written: essay from a given or chosen title, reports, and/or portfolios.

Viva: oral exam.

Programme structure - programme rules and modules

BA (Hons) in Dance Practices

Students must chose 2 modules (40 credits) from the following: 5265SSLN Performance in Context; 5266SSLN Screen and Site Based Creative Practices; 5267SSLN Work-Based Learning for the Dance Practitioner; 5268SSLN Choreography. Each module is worth 20 credits.

Students will be offered the opportunity of study abroad at Level 5. The programme will offer the opportunity of 60 credits of study at Level 5. Students will be enrolled on a 360 credit honours with study abroad programme. A 60 credit Level 5 study abroad module 5270SSLN Study Semester Abroad – Dance Practices will normally replace the semester 1 modules on the standard programme. This study abroad should cover the same learning outcomes as the modules being replaced. The modules to be studied in the host institution must be agreed in advance. The Level 5 mean for the final award mark will be calculated based upon the 120 credits at Level 5.

Students must also chose one of the following 40 credit modules: 6270SSLN Dissertation (Practice-led) or 6271SSLN Dissertation.

Students must choose 2 modules (40credits) from the following: 6265SSLN Projects@LJMU; 6266SSLN Individually Negotiated Project; 6267SSLN Teaching & Facilitating; 6268SSLN Performance & Technology. Each module is worth 20 credits.

Opportunities for work-related learning (location and nature of activities)

All Work Related Learning activity within the programme enables students to work away from campus in an area of the industry of their choosing (e.g. schools/colleges, a dance agency, youth dance groups, integrated dance groups). However, students are also able to work on suitable projects within relevant departments within the University.

The dance programme values the contribution that placement activity can make to the learners ability to both transfer knowledge and skills to another context or share learned practice as a result of being on a placement. In the programme there are two distinctive manners in which placement is constructed and delivered:

-External placement provision where host organisations take students and support their learning through an

individually negotiated learner contract

-Internal placement practice in the studio environment with professional mentoring support the practice-led enquiry of the student

This degree includes a range of work-based and work related learning opportunities to ensure that students are as current and up to date with their knowledge as possible and have the ability to create networks. Throughout the programme students have access to masterclasses, projects and visiting guest artists who will share examples of their work. Alongside this, opportunities through placement to observe, assist and lead in such workplaces for example as schools, colleges, national dance agencies, community arts projects, hospitals, small dance companies, theatres, community centres, residential homes all of which engage students in both practical and theoretical thinking.

Internally (because of the specialist facilities) we are able to offer students placement practice to devise/create own choreographic or performance work. During this process they have access to a professional mentor for advice and guidance.
